On a motion by David Hoyle and second by Mike Alford, the Minutes of the October 3, 2024 meeting was approved as presented in **EXHIBIT A**.

On a motion by Joe Budd and second by John Alexander, the Commission approved the proposed 2025 Wildlife Resources Commission meeting schedule as presented in **EXHIBIT C**

Presentation of the Order of the Long Leaf Pine Award – Chairman Crump introduced members of the Ingram Family to present the Order of the Long Leaf Pine Award to Executive Director Cameron Ingram.

COMMITTEE MEETING REPORTS

Boating Safety Committee Report – December 4, 2024 – *J.C. Cole, Chair* reported the Boating Safety Committee met on December 4, 2024. *Betsy Haywood, No Wake Zone Coordinator*, presented permanent rulemaking adoption for Brunswick, Carteret, Alexander, and Mecklenburg and Gaston counties. She then presented Rulemaking Notice of Text requests for Craven, Caswell, and Person counties. The committee recommends approval of these items. There being no further business, the committee adjourned.

Small Game & Wild Turkey Committee Report – December 4, 2024 – *Jim Ruffin, Chair* reported the Small Game and Wild Turkey Committee met on December 4, 2024. *Chris Kreh, Wildlife Management Division Assistant Chief*, provided a presentation on the Caswell Small Game Focal Area, highlighting current and long-term small game surveys and monitoring efforts. He also shared examples of habitat work conducted in the area and the positive response of quail and turkey populations to increased usable habitat on the landscape. Chairman Ruffin provided a high-level update on a workgroup formed to develop a plan for quail restoration across the state. The results of this workgroup will be brought back to the committee and the full Commission for consideration in the future. With no further business, the committee adjourned.

Fisheries Committee Report – December 4, 2024 – *John Stone, Chair* reported the Fisheries Committee met on December 4, 2024. *Christian Waters, Inland Fisheries Division Chief*, presented staff recommendations for Enhanced Delayed Harvest Trout Waters. The program will enhance a select number of delayed harvest streams with an increased number of larger trout, exceeding 18 inches in length. Initial stockings will occur once renovations are complete on all trout hatcheries. Program name, site locations, and further details will be incorporated in the review of the Mountain Trout Management Plan. *Corey Oakley, Inland Fisheries Division Assistant Chief*, discussed trout production impacts from Hurricane Helene which included severe damage to the infrastructure at Armstrong State Fish Hatchery and stream damage at the Bobby N. Setzer Fish Hatchery. Repairs at Armstrong are expected to be completed by January 2026, and the renovation of Setzer has been delayed temporarily to maintain the Commission's stocked trout program until the Armstrong hatchery can be restored. Fisheries staff stocked available delayed harvest locations in November, will stock delayed harvest locations again in December as well as winter small impoundments, and plan to stock delayed harvest and hatchery supported waters as scheduled in the spring. Corey also gave an overview of the Gladly Fork Fish Hatchery, a private facility in Transylvania County being considered for acquisition. With no additional topics, the meeting was adjourned.

Land Acquisition and Property Committee Report – December 4, 2024 – *Tom Berry, Chair* reported the Land Acquisition and Property Committee met on December 4, 2024. The Committee reviewed and approved ten Phase I land acquisition proposals, totaling just over 6,400 acres. It was noted the Hickorynut Mountain project would establish a new game land in McDowell County. The Committee also reviewed and approved seven Phase II land acquisition proposals, totaling 3,577 acres. The Committee noted the 2,475-acre Big Swamp tract in Robeson County will establish a new game land in an underserved region of state. The Committee reviewed two other property matters, including a right of way request at Sandhills Game Land, and a right of way request at Neuse River Game Land. The Committee tabled the Sandhills Game Land right of way request and asked that staff to obtain more information about the request prior to any decision from the Committee and Board. The Committee denied the Neuse River Game Land right of way request. With no additional topics, the meeting was adjourned.

Big Game Committee Report – December 4, 2024 – *David Hoyle, Chair* reported the Big Game Committee met on December 4, 2024. *Brad Howard, Wildlife Management Division Chief*, briefed

the committee on potential statutory language that would accommodate a raffle and auction for elk hunting permits, possibly in the 2026 season. The Committee decided to include in the statute the condition that anyone entering the raffle would be required to provide proof of a North Carolina hunting license. Next, staff discussed ideas and upcoming decisions that would be required relative to new rules designed to manage our areas where CWD is known to exist, including potentially examining new carcass disposal rules. The goal of all the rules will be to maintain hunter participation and satisfaction while attempting to implement herd management strategies designed to minimize or delay the spread of the disease on the landscape. Having no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Executive Committee Report – December 3, 2024 – *Monty Crump, Chair* reported the Executive Committee met on December 3, 2024 and adjourned into a closed session after opening the meeting review and discuss candidates for the Executive Director position under NCGS 143-318.11(a)(6). After returning to open session, the meeting was adjourned.

Committee of The Whole Report – December 4, 2024 – *Monty Crump, Chair* reported The Committee of the Whole met on December 4, 2024 and began with an excellent presentation on the agency's response to Hurricane Helene, including the significant emergency response performed by our Law Enforcement officers and especially our swift water rescue team, and the impacts to fish and wildlife in western North Carolina and the agency's infrastructure. *Carrie Ruhlman, Rulemaking Coordinator*, reviewed rulemaking adoptions and Notices of Text. *Cameron Ingram, Executive Director* reviewed the Commission Meeting schedule for 2025. *Commissioners Wes Seegars and Kelly Davis* briefly discussed the history of canids on the Albemarle Peninsula and their participation, along with WRC staff, on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Red Wolf Recovery Team. The discussion concluded with a recommendation to adopt a new resolution, read into the minutes by *Kyle Briggs, Chief Deputy Director*, to replace the Commission's previous resolutions. The committee then went into closed session to consult with agency counsel to preserve attorney-client privilege and discuss candidates for the Executive Director position.

Motion from the Committee of Whole Regarding AP Candid Resolution – On a motion by Wes Seegars and a second by Brad Stanback, the Commission approved a motion to adopt a Resolution on Red Wolves.

Motion from the Committee of Whole Regarding Delegation of Authority – On a motion by Mark Craig and a second by J. C. Cole, the Commission approved a motion to delegate authority to the Executive Director to investigate alleged encroachments upon, usurpation of, or other actions in violation of the public trust rights of the people of the State and to initiate civil actions to remove or restrain any unlawful or unauthorized encroachment, usurpation of, or any other violation of the public trust rights of the people of the State or legal rights of access to such public trust areas pursuant to NCGS 113-131.

Motion from the Committee of Whole Regarding Executive Director Position – On a motion by John Alexander and a second by John Coley, the Commission approved a motion to appoint Michael Kyle Briggs to be the Commission’s Executive Director effective January 1, 2025.

Having no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

AGENCY SPOTLIGHT – Invasive Catfish Management in the Coastal Plain – *TD VanMiddlesworth, District 2 Fisheries Biologist II*, gave a presentation to provide an overview of NCWRC invasive catfish and management of them in the North Carolina coastal plain. The focus was invasive Flathead Catfish and Blue Catfish biology and distribution, conservation concerns, recreational and commercial opportunities, management, and monitoring and research.

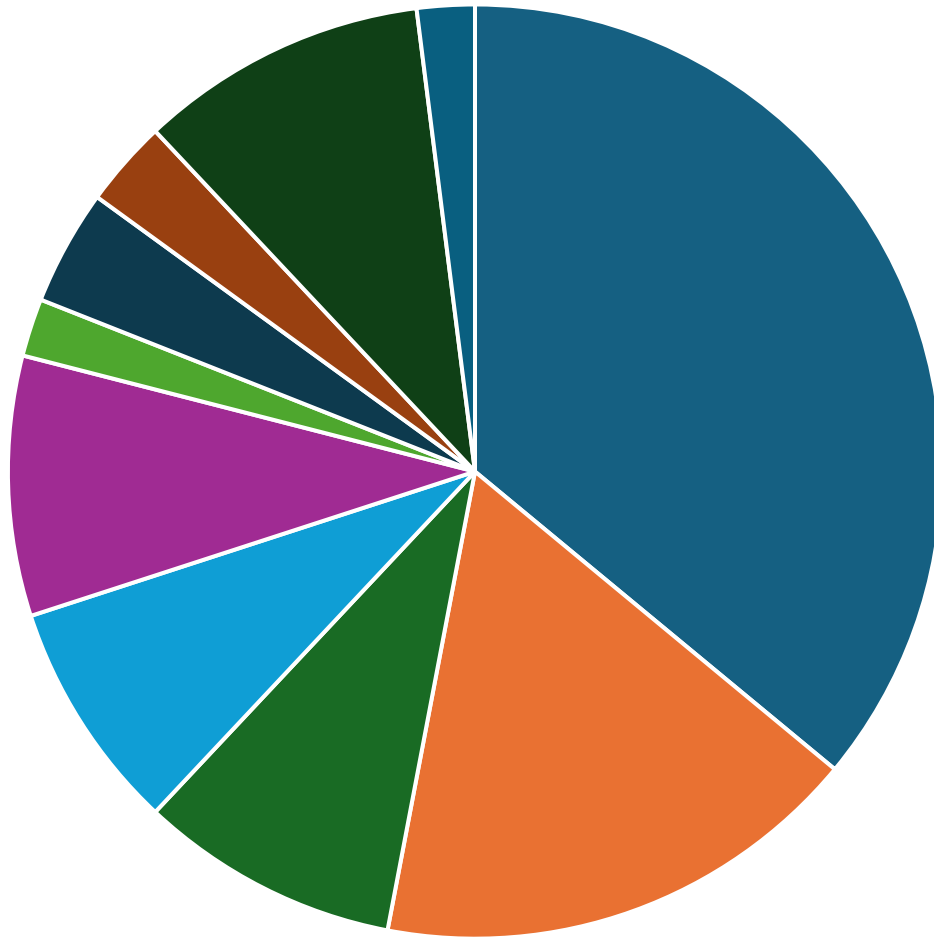

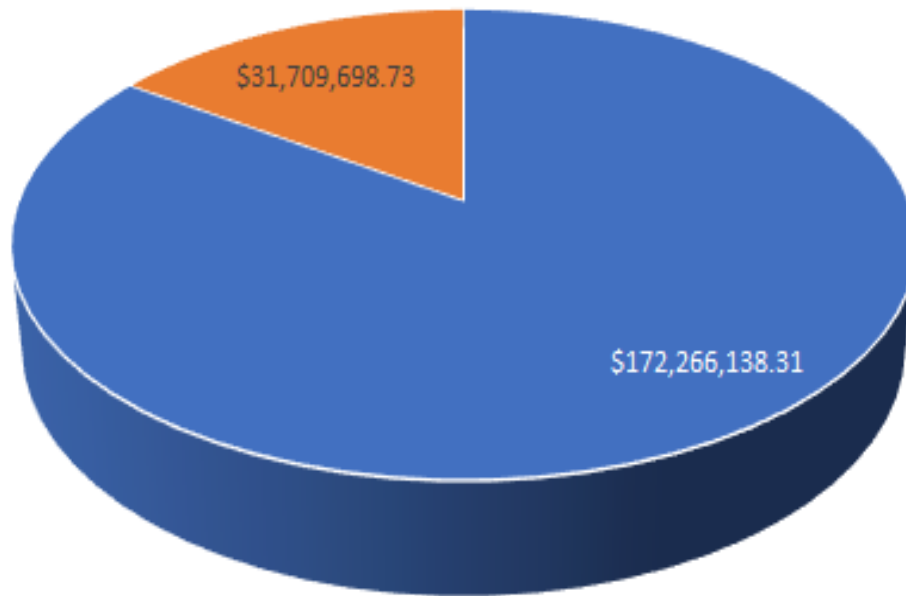

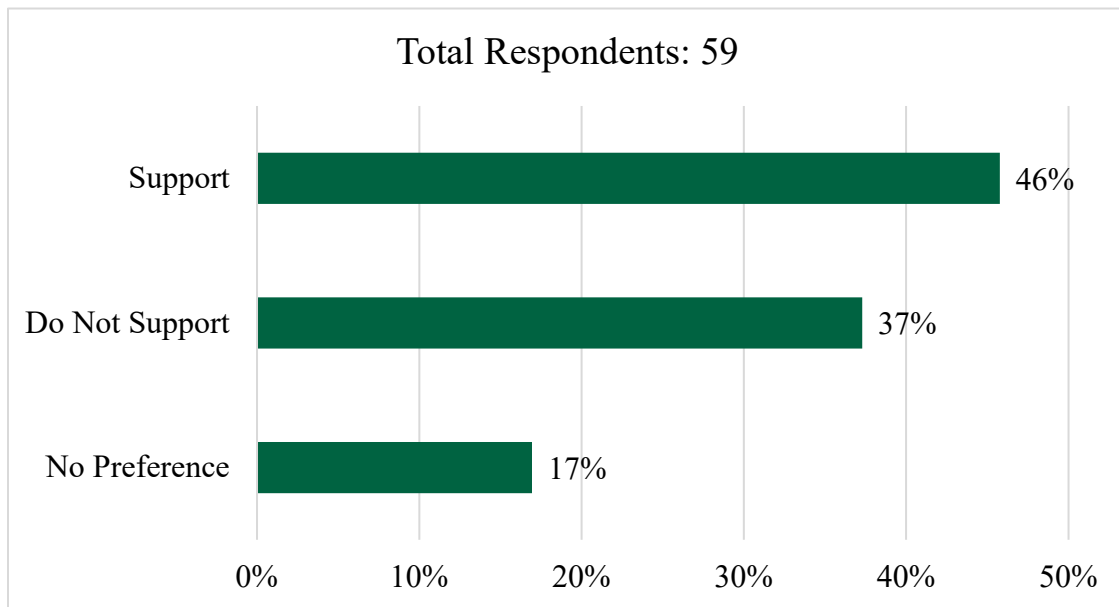

ADOPTION OF PERMANENT AMENDMENT

15A NCAC 10F .0304 BLADEN COUNTY, WHITE LAKE

The Wildlife Resources Commission staff were notified of safety hazards to non-motorized boaters and water recreationists, created by the recent Rule revisions for the Restricted Area at White Lake in Bladen County. That revision allowed vessels to travel parallel to the shoreline at no-wake speed within the Restricted Area. Codifying a permanent Rule in 15A NCAC 10F .0304, to prohibit motorboats from travelling parallel to the shoreline in the Restricted Area at White Lake, will mitigate hazards to swimmers and non-motorized boaters within the area.

Staff seeks your adoption of the proposed Rule amendment, subject to final review by the N.C. Rules Review Commission. The earliest effective date of the Rule will be April 1, 2025.

15A NCAC 10F .0304 BLADEN COUNTY

(a) Regulated Areas. This Rule applies to the following waters in Bladen County:

- (1) White Lake. The water between the shoreline and ~~no-wake~~ regulatory markers 500 feet from the shoreline is a Restricted Area.
- (2) Cape Fear River:
 - (A) the waters shore to shore between a point 100 yards east and 100 yards west of the ferry cable at Elwell Ferry and Elwells Ferry Boating Access Area, 2702 Elwell Ferry Road, Council;
 - (B) the waters within 50 yards of the Tar Heel Boating Access Area, 1000 Wildlife Landing Drive, Tar Heel; and
 - (C) the waters within 50 yards of the Tory Hole Boating Access Area, 335 N. Poplar Street, Elizabethtown.
- (3) Black River. The waters within 50 yards of the Hunts Bluff Boating Access Area, 351 Hunts Bluff Road, Kelly.

(b) Restricted Area. ~~Skating is prohibited.~~ Motorboats, as defined in G.S. 75A-2(1e), shall not be operated on a course parallel to the shoreline in the ~~restricted~~ area described in Subparagraph (a)(1) of this Rule.

(c) Diving. A person engaged in skin or scuba diving shall display a diver's flag, and no vessel shall approach within 50 feet of a diver's flag, as described in G.S. 75A-13.1.

(d) Speed Limit. No person shall operate a ~~vessel~~~~motorboat~~ at greater than no-wake speed within the regulated areas described in Subparagraphs (a)(1) and (3), and Parts (a)(2)(A) through (C) of this Rule.

(e) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The following agencies shall place and maintain the markers implementing this Rule:

- (1) North Carolina State Parks for the regulated area designated in Subparagraph (a)(1) of this Rule; and
- (2) the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission for the regulated areas designated in Parts (a)(2)(A) through (C), and Subparagraph (a)(3) of this Rule.

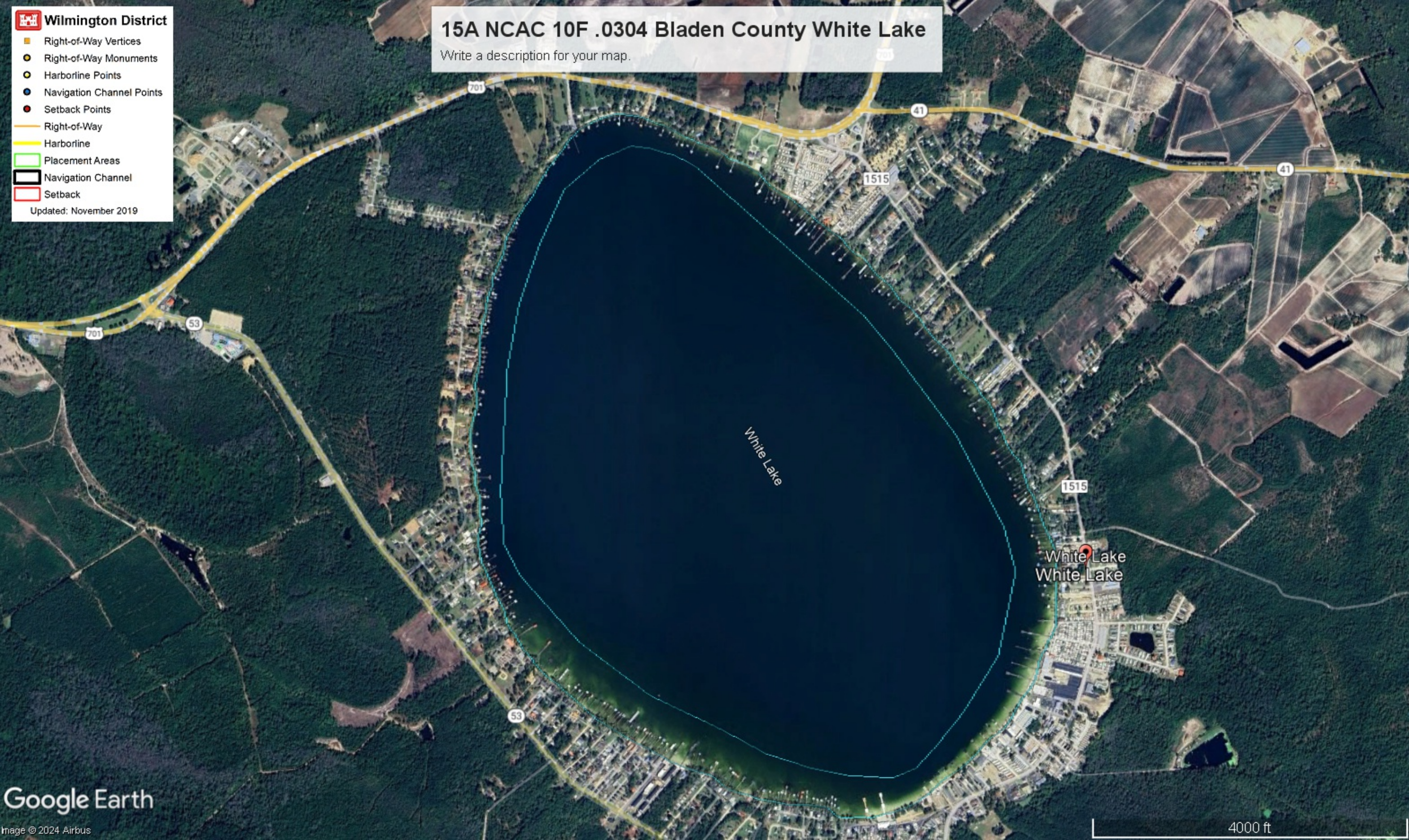
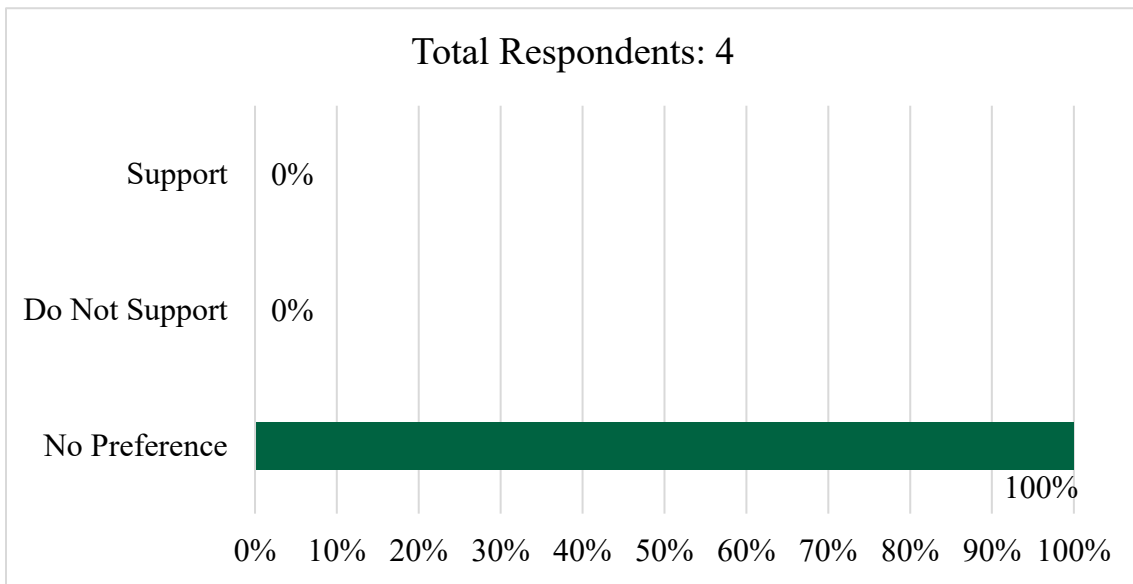

Proposed Temporary Amendments to 10F .0307 – Catawba, Iredell, Lincoln, and Mecklenburg Counties Recommended by Agency Staff for Adoption

Wildlife Resources Commission staff were recently notified of safety concerns and enforcement challenges surrounding vessel liveries on Lake Norman. Despite the ability of the Lake Norman Marine Commission to establish regulations concerning public recreation and water safety, enforcement of those regulations without joint resolution, as required by S.L.1969-1089, or rules, has been difficult, leading to lack of action against liveries and increased safety concerns among lake users.

Codifying vessel livery safety requirements in Rule will clarify standards for livery companies, facilitate and streamline enforcement activities, and improve public safety.

15A NCAC 10F .0307 CATAWBA, IREDELL, LINCOLN, AND MECKLENBURG COUNTIES

1 **15A NCAC 10F .0307 CATAWBA, IREDELL, LINCOLN, AND MECKLENBURG COUNTIES**

2 (a) Regulated Area. This Rule shall apply to Lake Norman in Catawba, Iredell, Lincoln, and Mecklenburg counties:

- 3 (1) within 50 yards of the shoreline at Jetton Park in Mecklenburg County, from a point on the west side of
4 the park at 35.47082 N, 80.90427 W, south and around the point at 35.46703 N, 80.90360 W, then
5 northeast to a point at 35.47262 N, 80.89727 W;
- 6 (2) Bluff Point Cove in Cornelius shore to shore, east of a line from a point 50 yards west of the south shore
7 of the cove mouth at 35.45327 N, 80.89520 W to a point 50 yards west of the north shore of the cove
8 mouth at 35.45487 N, 80.89440 W; and
- 9 (3) the cove immediately north of the inlet of Hager Creek in Iredell County, north of a line from a point on
10 the north shore at 35.55760 N, 80.94730 W southwest to a point on the island at the inlet of Hager Creek
11 at 35.55695 N, 80.94971 W, and east of a line from the same point on the island northwest to a point on
12 the north shore at 35.55754 N, 80.95029 W.

13 (b) Speed Limit. No person shall operate a vessel at greater than no wake speed within the regulated areas described in
14 Paragraph (a) of this Rule and as set forth in G.S. 75A-14.1.

15 (c) Swimming Areas. No person operating or responsible for the operation of a vessel shall permit it to enter any marked
16 swimming area on the waters of Lake Norman.

17 (d) Placement and Maintenance of Markers. The Lake Norman Marine Commission shall be the designated agency for
18 placement and maintenance of navigational aids and regulatory markers on the waters of Lake Norman.

19 (e) Vessel Liveries. Vessel liveries operating on Lake Norman shall conduct the following activities with each vessel renter
20 prior to relinquishing control of the vessel:

- 21 (1) a pre-rental vessel inspection to ensure that safety equipment required by Rule 10F .0201 is on board and
22 accessible; and
- 23 (2) provide and review instruction on safe operation of the vessel rented including review of navigation rules
24 in G.S. 75A-6.1, operating restrictions in G.S. 75A-10, an electronic or waterproof navigational map of
25 Lake Norman, and the U.S. Coast Guard's U.S. Aids to Navigation System pamphlet.

26 Documentation of adherence to these requirements shall be signed by both parties and be available for inspection by law
27 enforcement officers upon request from the livery company for up to two years and from the vessel renter while that
28 individual is in control of the vessel.

Proposed Temporary Amendments to 15A NCAC 10C .0325 Sea Trout Rule Recommended by Agency Staff for Public Notice, Comment, and Presentation at Public Hearing

The N.C. Division of Marine Fisheries (NCDMF) has issued a proclamation closing recreational and commercial harvest for Spotted Sea Trout in joint and coastal fishing waters until June 15, 2025, due to a cold stun event, consistent with the North Carolina Spotted Sea Trout Fishery Management Plan. The proposed amendment will close Spotted Sea Trout harvest until June 15, 2025 in waters within NCWRC's jurisdiction (Inland Fishing Waters and hook-and-line in Joint Fishing Waters) to be consistent with the NCDMF closure.
